Biometric attendance is maintained for both the teaching and the non teaching faculty. The e pay roll system is followed for the salary of teaching and the non teaching staff. The CCTV Surveillance helps in the administration of the institution to monitor and control various academic and non academic activities. The e governance administrative mechanism is successfully used in conveying decisions taken by the Management, Principal and different committees. The institution also maintains the Financial Accounts and Auditing which is done by the Chartered Accountant appointed by the Management once in every three months. All these records are maintained digitally by our College Accounts section. Thus MIS of our college is actively being utilized for administrative and financial management.</p>

Curriculum is an important aspect of education as it provides a platform for teacher and students to realise the learning goals and enable the students to scale the levels of learning. It is an interactive process which includes specific goals, contexts, strategies, examination, assessment and the teaching learning resources. The college is affiliated to Karnatak University, Dharwad and follows the academic curriculum prescribed by the university. The academic calendar of the college is based on the calendar provided by the university. Mechanism for the well planned curriculum delivery consists of : ?Distribution of syllabi among the departments and in turn among teachers. ?Allocation of subject papers within each department ?Preparation of action plans taking into consideration objectives of the curriculum, the number of teachers and students and infrastructure available. ?Before the commencement of the academic year, the time table committee prepares the master time table of the college and ensures effective and timely implementation of the curriculum through infrastructural planning in terms of number of classrooms and academic resources. ?Preparation of departmental and individual teachers' time tables. ?Preparation of teaching plan and teaching schedule and course outlines/objectives of each class. ?Departmental internal subject meetings are held to ensure the subject specific objectives are imbibed within broad academic framework. The process of delivery, pace, assessment and periodical reviews of curriculum progression are decided and discussed in the internal subject meeting which are then documented in the form of minutes. ?The academic plan is transitioned into effective action through lectures, presentations, assignments, seminars, tutorials, project works, workshops and discussions. Documentation is maintained in the form of attendance records and analysis. ?Teaching through ICT enabled techniques. ?Conduct of interactive sessions at the end of class room teaching sessions. ?Organising field studies and study tours by relevant departments, wherever is necessary and possible. ?Identification of laggard and slow learners and conducting apt remedial coaching for such students. Motivating advanced learners by providing updated knowledge related to the subject. ?Mentor system focuses on individual students, personality and career development, personal emotional and academic counselling. ?Maintenance of daily work diaries by all teachers. ?Procurement of books in respect of new subject papers introduced or syllabi revised. The curriculum is suitable enriched to be representative of stakeholders' expectations in catering to the needs of the society and economy. Special lecture programmers, workshops and seminars by eminent personalities from academics, corporate sector, policy making bodies and media are conducted regularly to ensure the curriculum to be more effective. ?There is revision of syllabus for B.A. programme by the Karnatak University , Dharwad for the courses viz., Economics(optional) and History (optional) from 2019-20 and onwards. It is effectively implemented for first and second semester of B.A. programme. Similarly, there is change in syllabus of English (Basic) for V and VI semester classes and it is implemented for the final year of B.A.programme. ?During unexpected Covid-19 pandemic situation the online platforms like Zoom, Cisco Webex and other platforms were used for implementation of curriculum and motivated students to engage in academic activities. Apart from this to cope up with Covid -19 pandemic situation, students were motivated to participate in Co-curricular Extra-curricular activities organized by different academic institutions and organizations. As a result students positively responded and actively participated in various activities like Quiz, Paper presentation, short film making, skill enrichment programmes etc. In the interest of students, mentors organized syllabi related Quiz, National Webinars and also provided web links of concepts related to their subjects. All these activities were helpful in boosting the confidence of the students in writing the final examinations successfully. For the smooth functioning and strengthening of the mentoring system, we adopted to practice feedback mechanism to achieve desired results on different aspects. We are monitoring, guiding and motivating the students effectively for the holistic development of the students.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The institutions continuous internal evaluation system focuses on the all round development of the students. The evaluation of students on the basis of examination is an integral part of teaching and learning process. The students' internal and external examination performance is evaluated regularly. As an affiliated institution of Karnataka University Dharwad, the evaluation norms of the university are followed. The college has adopted a method to assess the academic performance of students on a continuous basis. For U.G programme, the institute conducts Two I.A Tests and Home Assignments. 20 marks are allotted for internal exams and 80 marks for external exams. For U.G programme 50 marks are allotted for practicals 100 marks for external theory exams. For the P.G programme as per CBCS, for 4 credits per paper, 25 marks are allotted to I.A and 75 marks to external theory exams for 2credits per paper, 15 marks are allotted to I.A and 35 marks to external theory exams. Apart from this, the institutes systematic Mentor System, Parents' Meet, Remedial Classes helps to evaluate students' progress and potentiality. To improve the performance of the students, the institution has introduced significant reforms in continuous internal evaluation: Seminar- Participation of students in seminars helps us to evaluate students' skills, subject knowledge and communicative ability. Group Discussion- On current issues and syllabi related topics helps to evaluate students' general/social awareness and also enhances knowledge by sharing thoughts among themselves. Project work-Helps to evaluate students' active participation and enhances critical thinking, analytical as well as collaborative learning skills. These reforms have shown improvements in students' performance, time management, writing ability and ultimately resulting into academic excellence of students.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The present competitive era expects every educational institution to provide necessary skills and additional knowledge along with the prescribed syllabus. To meet out this expectation a systematic calendar of events becomes essential. Context: Environment plays a vital role in quality of life of all living organism also human life. Hence the institution takes pledge to raise an environment conscious community of educated fraternity. The green policies of the institution are clearly documented in Green Audit and are being implemented. The initiatives taken by the Institution to make the campus eco-friendly: a. Energy Conservation: The institution has set up solar energy panels in garden and around 30 LED lights in the campus passage in both the floors and in Office and Principal chamber. b. Use of renewable energy: Promotion of solar power usage through solar panel and the Vermicompost setup also helps in proper disposal of organic waste and in turn the compost produced is used in fertilizing the garden. As our classrooms are surrounded with medicinal garden at the back and lush green garden in the front the ventilation is naturally being done, there by less usage of fans. The classrooms are well lit by the natural light and hence the usage of electricity for lighting is also minimal. c.
